<i>Group IV. Science and Mathematics Group Requirement</i>	8
Take two courses from 2 subject areas: ASTR 104, BIOL 101, 109, 110; CHEM 100, 110, 210; GEOG 100; PHYS 111, 201.	
Take one course from the following: MATH 111, 112, 124, 128, 130,135, 140, 141.	
<i>Group V. Humanities Group Requirement</i>	8
Take two courses from 2 subject areas: ART 141, 211, 212; LITE 216; MUSI 211; THEA 121,122.	
Take one course from the following: LITE 105, 213, 223.

- Completion of course requirements in Groups I, III, IV and V satisfies the MACRAO Agreement between KCC and Eastern Michigan University.

Note: Your transfer school may require you to complete junior and senior level general education courses to meet graduation requirements.

Note: This guide is not intended to satisfy the requirements for an Associate Degree at KCC.

Admission Criteria

In order to apply to the Initial Teacher Preparation Program, you must be admitted to EMU and have completed 56 credit hours. Completion of at least 12 credit hours from EMU.

- A cumulative EMU GPA of 2.50 or higher. Transfer grades are not used in the calculation.
- A major (or three minor) GPA at EMU of 2.50 or higher. Transfer grades are not used in the calculation. The student needs to have at least one class from the major (or three minors) completed at EMU in order to have a major (or three minor) GPA.
- A grade of "C" or higher in the following courses:

If Elementary: ENGL 121, CTAC 124 (formerly CTAS 121 or 124), MATH 108, MATH 110E, PHY 100, CHEM 101, ESSC 202, and all classes in the College of Education.

If Secondary: ENGL 121, CTAC 124 (formerly CTAS 121 or 124), the math reasoning requirement from general education, the lab science requirement from general education, and all classes in the College of Education.

NOTE: Some students don't have all of these courses done by the time they reach 56 credit hours. Apply to the program, and we will look at the courses that you have completed.

- Proof of passing scores on all three sections of the [Michigan Test for Teacher Certification \(MTTC\) Basic Skills test](#).
- Passing scores on the speech and hearing tests. These tests are offered for free on some Friday mornings in 135 Porter. In addition, they are offered the first five days of the Fall, Winter, and Spring semesters.
- Autobiography statement about your experiences with youth/children. Your autobiography should also explain why you want to become a teacher. This statement will be read for content, grammar and punctuation.
- Freedom from civil/criminal conviction issues, academic probation, or administrative probation. If you answer yes to any of the civil/criminal conviction questions on the application, you will provide: 1) a copy of the Judgment of Sentence, Registrar of Actions or Certification of Conviction, and 2) a written explanation of the offense(s). Students with civil criminal conviction issues will be carefully reviewed before an admission decision is made.
- Self-evaluation of professional behaviors.
- Meeting academic, social, moral and financial obligations as a member of the EMU community.

Students must meet all of the admission requirements at the time of application. There is no conditional or probationary admission to the program.

Secondary Education (Grades 6-12)

EMU prepares teachers in a variety of subjects at the secondary level. The secondary teaching certificate allows you to teach grades 6-12 in your major and minor.

If you want to become a secondary teacher, there are three major components to the courses that you must take:

- You will be required to complete a group of general education courses.
- You will complete a major and, in most instances, a minor from among certain

minors.

- You will complete your studies with a series of professional education courses, concluding with student teaching.

Following is a list of the approved majors and minors for secondary education students at EMU.
