
Fall 2016 Enrollment Data

Kellogg Community College operates on a traditional academic year calendar with three semesters (fall, spring and summer). The following fall enrollment data is the institution's official fall data as reported to the U.S. Department of Education by way of the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) with an official count date of October 15, 2016. 
Student-to-faculty ratio (Fall 2016)

Kellogg Community College takes pride in serving students individually with small class sizes, and with easy access to faculty and staff. The student to faculty ratio is determined by dividing the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty (full-time plus one-third of part-time faculty) by the number of FTE students (full-time plus one-third of part-time students). For fall 2016, the faculty FTE was 146 and the student FTE was 2390. Therefore, our student to faculty ratio is 16 to 1.




Fall 2016 Undergraduate Student Characteristics


The following charts and graphs depict the demographics (male vs. female, full-time vs. part-time, age and ethnicity) of the College's student body for fall 2016. This data represents students who are seeking a degree or a certificate.



Percent of undergraduate degree/certificate-seeking students who are female:	67%
Percent of undergraduate degree/certificate-seeking students who are male:	33%
Percent of undergraduate degree/certificate-seeking students who are full-time:	32%
Percent of undergraduate degree/certificate-seeking students who are part-time:	68%



The Enrollment by Age data chart does not include 29 students with age unknown.




Undergraduate Retention Rates for Fall 2016

The fall 2016 retention rate measures students seeking a degree or certificate who started in the fall 2015 semester and have either returned for the fall 2016 semester (still enrolled) or who have completed their program of study as of fall 2016. Also, these students have not attended any other college prior to enrolling at KCC. We refer to these students as first-time degree- or certificate-seeking students

First-time, full-time degree/certificate-seeking student retention rate	56%
First-time, part-time degree/certificate-seeking student retention rate	37%

Retention Rate Trend

As we look at past retention rates for first-time degree- or certificate-seeking students, both full-time and part-time, we see that student retention remains fairly stable.



Undergraduate Persistence Rates – Fall 2015 to Spring 2016

The rate of persistence measures students who persist from one semester to the next. For this measure we will look at the total of full-time and part-time students who are taking courses for credit (as opposed to 0 credit or CEU courses). In the table below, we look at persistence from the fall 2015 semester to the spring 2016 semester.

Full-time Undergraduate Graduation Rates for the Fall 2013 Cohort

Graduation rates as reported to the U.S. Department of Education by way of the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) are calculated on a cohort of first-time, full-time, degree- or certificate-seeking undergraduates and tracks them for 150% of the normal time to completion in their program of study to see how many students complete. The students calculated in the rate below enrolled in KCC in the fall 2013 semester. There were 297 first-time, full-time degree- and certificate-seeking students; 41 of those students graduated from KCC within 150% (3 years).

However, the success of community college students is more complicated to measure because a great many students only attend part-time. In fact, 75% of all students at KCC in the fall 2016 semester were enrolled part-time. Therefore, if we track both full-time and part-time students who are pursuing a certificate or a degree and who entered college for the first time during the fall 2010 semester, we are able to see the success of *all* degree- or certificate-seeking students at KCC. We should also consider the number of students who transfer from KCC to another institution to continue on with their education.

Pell Grants and Subsidized Stafford Loan Recipients

The chart below provides data on the number of first-time, full-time students enrolled in the fall 2013 semester who completed a certificate or degree within 150% of normal time and who received a Pell grant or was the recipient of a subsidized Stafford Loan.
